Grads ready to pursue dreams

The NRG Stadium floor looked like a black tide May 14 as San Jacinto College graduates rose to their feet to move the tassels on their mortarboards.

During the evening ceremony, 1,626 graduates walked across the commencement stage to accept their diplomas. The College awarded 3,352 certificates and degrees.

Students start at San Jac for many reasons - from getting a solid foundation before transferring or reskilling mid-career to earning a workforce certificate or degree. This spring's graduates ranged from 14 to 74 years old, proving it's never too early or too late to pursue dreams.

Honors students earn accolades

San Jacinto College honors program students racked up accolades this spring.

In early March 2024, the Texas State Historical Association presented C.M. Caldwell Awards for best research papers in Texas history. Of four awards for freshmen and sophomores, three went to San Jac honors students:

These students' papers may be published in next year's "Touchstone," the Walter Prescott Webb Historical Society's journal. This year's "Touchstone" featured articles by San Jac's 2023 winners: Annie Forte, Tony Gamage, Lana Tran, and Nancy Zamora.

In addition, the Walter Prescott Webb Historical Society named the College's South Campus Chapter, advised by Dr. Abbie Grubb, its Chapter of the Year.

Later in March, 20 San Jac honors students presented their research at the Great Plains Honors Council conference. Competing against other community college and university students with under 60 credit hours, four students won John Britt Poster Awards in social sciences and

NEW PROGRAMS COMING IN FALL 2024

San Jacinto College is offering several new degrees and certificates in fall 2024. These programs will support the needs of the local job market, ensuring students are equipped with relevant skills for in-demand careers.

Criminal Justice, Associate of Arts

The Associate of Arts degree in criminal justice is designed for transfer to complete a Bachelor of Arts in criminal justice or other compatible degree plan.

This associate degree will transfer to any public Texas four-year college or university with a criminal justice major.

Locations: Central Campus, North Campus, and San Jac Online

Sociology, Associate of Arts

Interested in studying social interaction, social change, and the causes and consequences of group behavior? Sociology majors examine these and various topics like social stratification and inequality, race relations, gender and sexuality, marriage and family, crime and violence, economics, politics, and religion.

The College offers transfer paths for students planning to complete a major at a four-year or upper-level institution.

Mental Health Addiction Study, Associate of Applied Science

Are you a good listener who enjoys offering comfort to others during tough times? This degree plan prepares students to become mental health

technicians, and it combines the mental health substance use disorder counseling Level 2 certificate and the mental health substance use prevention specialist occupational certificate.

The mental health addiction study program trains students to offer specialized counseling and assistance to individuals and families grappling with the challenges of substance abuse. Each program offers a practicum class that allows students to apply classroom skills in a treatment setting.

Graduates will be able to work in substance abuse and mental health facilities in both private and nonprofit organizations such as:

- In-patient psychiatric and outpatient hospitals
- · Veteran affairs clinics
- Nursing homes
- · Research facilities
- Pain management clinics
- Counseling and drug rehab centers

Magnetic Resonance Imaging, Associate of Applied Science

Discover a rewarding career as a magnetic resonance imaging technologist. Gain essential skills in MRI procedures and patient care and collaborate with medical teams through hands-on clinical rotations.

Students will learn about the heart of health care innovation and position themselves for success in this thriving field.

MRI technologists use magnetic fields and radio waves to aid in diagnosing diseases. They ensure patient care, adhere to safety protocols, assess image quality, and exercise professional judgment.

Graduates can find employment in hospitals, clinics, or imaging centers. Location: Central Campus

Dance Instructor, Certificate of Technology

Passionate about dance? San Jac's dance instructor program offers tailored coursework led by experienced instructors. Get the skills and hands-on experience needed to transform the love for dance into a new profession.

The program provides basic preparation for entrylevel employment, developing skills in pedagogy, movement, technology, and performance, culminating in a two-semester internship at a local dance studio.

Barbering, Certificate of Technology

Want to help others look and feel their best? The barbering program at San Jac prepares students for a rewarding career.

Students train to become licensed Class A barbers in Texas. The 1,000-hour program (31 college credits) offers comprehensive technical and practical training in barbering, including shaving, clipper cutting, men's grooming, and men's facials. Graduates are eligible to take the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation exam.

Work opportunities include barber shops, dual barber/ cosmetology salons, spas, or entrepreneurship.

FIVE REASONS TO CHOOSE ONLINE EDUCATION AT SAN JAC

Online education can be a saving grace to many individuals. San Jacinto College offers 26 associate degrees and 34 certificates 100% online, providing convenience and quality education from home.

Distance learning students have access to all the same resources available to every student at the College, including admissions advising, financial aid, education planning, counseling, tutoring, and career services. These services are available via live chat or Zoom.

Save valuable time

For many individuals, every minute counts when commuting between locations. Online education eliminates worries about traffic congestion, lengthy commutes, or waiting for public transportation. No need to search for a parking spot, make long treks across campus, or stress about arriving late to class. Less time spent in transit means more personal time.

Spend less

Enrolling in an online class can result in significant savings on transportation costs like gas, public transportation fares, and vehicle maintenance. This reduces the chance that car-related issues will hinder attending classes. Being home could mean less need to purchase meals and saving on childcare expenses.

Students statewide can register for online classes at San Jac, which eliminates the need to relocate and deal with moving costs.

Family time

For some students, sacrificing valuable family time and having limited availability for personal responsibilities are deal breakers.

"There is the convenience factor of

online education," said Niki Whiteside, assistant vice chancellor, instructional innovation and support. "Some students might have a full-time job and are unable to make it to campus, and others may not have a caretaker for their loved ones."

Studying in the comfort of home frees up valuable time and supports better work/life balance.

Health and wellness

Health issues like chronic pain can make it challenging to get to class. Attending school can also feel overwhelming for those dealing with mental health concerns.

"Anxiety, depression, and PTSD can make it hard to get to campus or feel comfortable while on campus," said Cayman Tirado, mental health services program director at the North Campus. "By having remote options, it can lower the barriers and allow interaction with safe boundaries."

Attending remotely offers students the comfort of a familiar environment.

"This can create a sense of security as well," Tirado said. "One my students shared that it was hard for her to get out of bed some days due to her depression. Just sitting up in bed and logging on to class helped her start to feel better and more connected."

Flexible options

San Jac offers three types of online classes that offer more flexibility:

- Online anytime: Classes are 100% online, with no scheduled meeting times.
- Online on a schedule: Classes are 100% online, but there are scheduled days and times each week where faculty and students meet via Zoom.
- Hybrid: This type combines online and in-person classes. Lectures may be offered online, and hands-on lab work is offered on campus.

"Students appreciate the flexibility of online learning," Whiteside said.
"By having the different modalities available, it helps students fit the pursuit of higher education into

Amy West and Ana Morales first crossed paths in Dr. Ivy Jenkins' principles of imports class at the San Jacinto College North Campus. This chance meeting led to a new job for Morales and a new colleague for West.

West, a port entry supervisor for the Port of Houston, came to San Jac as a 27-year veteran in the world of logistics.

"I have worked in the industry for almost 30 years, and with encouragement from friends and family, I decided to come to San Jac and get my degree," she said. "It was a bit daunting at first, but the staff here is amazing. Dr. Jenkins always checks in on us to ensure we are OK, which means a lot to me."

When a full-time position became available at her terminal, West knew she had great applicants sitting beside her daily in class and shared the opportunity with Jenkins.

"I encouraged all the students in the class to inquire about the open position," Jenkins said.
"It's always a great idea to get a job in the industry if possible.
Experiential learning is a valuable tool."

After learning about the job opportunity, Morales wasted no time applying and was interviewed just before the College's winter break. With her determination and skills shining through, Morales was offered a

logistics coordinator position at the Port of Houston.

"I was nervous to apply,"
Morales said. "I didn't think I
had enough experience, but I
gave it a shot anyway. Dr. Jenkins
encouraged me to go for it, and
I'm so glad it worked out."

Morales has been with the Port of Houston for five months, and according to her boss, West, "she's killing it."

"We had over 60 applicants for the coordinator role, but Ana definitely stood out," West said. "She has been a great asset to our team, and I know that the education she's getting is top-notch."

Morales and West continue their studies in the program while balancing their professional roles. Their story underscores the importance of grabbing opportunities and forging connections.

"You never know who you will sit next to in class," Morales said. "It might be your next boss."

CONTINUOUS RUN BRIDGES CLASSROOM KNOWLEDGE WITH REAL-WORLD EXPERIENCE

Since 2021, the continuous run at the LyondellBasell Center for Petrochemical, Energy, & Technology at San Jacinto College has evolved from a capstone project into an immersive experience that provides students with real-world insights and skills.

During the continuous run, students operate the facility's 8,000-square-foot glycol unit during shifts from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. for three days. This initiative began as an overnight event exclusively for process technology students but has expanded to various disciplines within CPET, including welding, electrical, and truck driving.

This initiative offers students a unique vantage point beyond traditional classroom settings. They gain exposure to live maintenance scenarios, troubleshooting challenges, and interdisciplinary collaboration. By experiencing real-time operations and maintenance tasks, students develop a holistic understanding of plant dynamics.

"A typical day kicks off with a safety meeting, followed by a briefing on the day's agenda," said Jeff Pearce, CPET education and workforce coordinator.

"Startup procedures precede
ongoing operations, punctuated
by sample testing to ensure
product quality."

While students inside the glycol unit's control room are starting up, maintenance projects are scheduled, with student operators overseeing and facilitating tasks. Shift changes every four hours and duty rotations every two hours ensure each student gains diverse experience.

"I've been here all three days of the run, and it's been busy," said Alexa DeLuna, CPET student. "Between getting the hang of the unit and getting into a flow with the other students, we have also been talking about future opportunities with several companies. I feel comfortable now on the console, in operations, and in special projects."

Traditionally, participation was reserved for students close to graduation, particularly those enrolled in the operations course. However, adding maintenance components has broadened participation to include students from all stages of their academic journey.

"I'm acting as a maintenance contractor this year, but next year, I'll be one of the operators

running the unit," said Andre Johnson, CPET student. "I have over 10 years of experience in refinery hydro blasting and emergency response. I'm familiar with the equipment, but learning what's required to run the unit is an eye-opening experience. I'm taking notes now so that when it's my turn I'll be better prepared."

Key learning outcomes encompass a spectrum of skills, from technical proficiency to teamwork and problem-solving. The continuous run cultivates adaptability, critical thinking, and professionalism by immersing students in real-world scenarios.

"The continuous run serves as a bridge between academia and industry, inviting industry partners to observe student performance," said Shawn Dickerson, process technology department chair. "By mirroring industry practices, CPET aims to showcase the skills and capabilities of its students, facilitating potential on-site recruitment opportunities."

These recruitment opportunities benefit students and the industry alike. As oil and gas sector representatives observe the students running their shifts, they can speak with them on the spot, giving them a leg up against

the competition.

"It's great to see the students in the field troubleshooting and problem-solving in real time," said Shane Harrington, Baystar production superintendent. "San Jac has the proper training facilities to set up individuals for success when they come to us in the field. They are fluent in reading piping and instrumentation diagrams and have a great understanding of equipment. It's been a successful partnership, and

that's why we continue to return each year."

The continuous run is one way CPET commits to experiential learning and industry relevance. As it continues to evolve, it remains a cornerstone of the educational experience, preparing students for the rigorous professional world.
